You should place your recycling containers at the end of your driveway late the night before or early in the morning. Please retrieve your recycling containers as soon as possible following pickup. If recycling day falls on a holiday, the recycling will be picked up the next day. The charge for recycling is included in your County tax bill. •

## Street Corner Repair

The corners at the intersection of Riggs Hill Way with Bordly Drive have become an eyesore. Vehicles tend to cut these corners too sharply causing deep gouges and gullies. They fill with water during rains making a muddy and slippery hazard for vehicles and pedestrians.

Board member Peter Schmidt brought this to the attention of the Montgomery County Department of Public Works and requested the installation of curbs, as was done at Lubar Way and Bordly Drive. The County responded stating that the installation of curbs, which might solve the corner cutting and tire ruts problem, would create other drainage problems and require installation of very costly underground storm drain systems that is not warranted in this area. Instead, they proposed to backfill and grade the ruts and depressions and to install delineators (also known as flags). The delineators are flexible 3-foot tall plastic tubes which will mark the edge of pavement and discourage drivers from cutting the corner. ��

# **Tree Trimming**

Please remember to trim any trees that encroach on the sidewalk along Bordly Drive. Tree branches should be trimmed up to a height of 8 feet above the sidewalk and 13.5 feet above the street. The HOA pays a landscaping firm to trim the trees along the common areas. Property owners are responsible for all trees in the public right-of-way (the area between the sidewalk and the street) along their property.

Please remember to use caution when using ladders or extension tools. It is also a good idea to wear protective gear, such as gloves and safety goggles, when trimming trees. •

# Gardening Tips for March

- Once new growth begins on trees and shrubs, cut back winter-killed twigs to living, green wood.
- Prune evergreen shrubs before growth starts.
- Boxwood should be pruned by thinning the outer foliage of the plant and cutting back the branches to retain the desired height.
- Prune spring-flowering shrubs after flowering is done.
- Hedges can receive their first pruning this month. As you prune, be sure to leave the base of the plant wider than the top. This allows sunlight to get to the bottom of the plant, creating a full, dense hedge.
- Don't leave stubs when pruning; stubs usually die and are entry points for decay fungus. Cut just outside the branch collar, the slightly thickened area at the base of the branch. Pruning should never be done in damp or wet weather when the fungal spores and bacteria that infect plants through fresh wounds spread easily.
- When pruning or cutting roses, cut all flower stems one quarter inch above a complete (five leaflet) leaf, leaving two complete leaves below the cut bud. Always use sharp, pruning shears and cut on a slant. •
