Every year, the kids, Terri and I look forward to visiting this slice of farm life/apple-pumpkin Americana. I go for the hot apple cider and warm apple fritters (covered in powdered sugar). Terri and the kids love the wooded hayride, hay maze, elevated goat-walk, Boo Barn (haunted house for younger folks) and the chance to pick your own pumpkins. And, there are plenty of photo opps too, if you carry a camera.

The hayride winds past a lake, through the woods, through a stream (yes, through) and back to the barn and, in the process, takes a short tour through American history, Harry Potter and Pooh's Hundred Acre Woods; all "re-enacted" by a cast of pumpkin-headed papier mache figures.

## A Note from Adam Sachs

Dear Friends:

My sister Pam and I are back home again, safe and sound, after a most incredible hike up Mt. Kilimanjaro.

It is so rare that an adventure exceeds one's (very high) expectations...but this one surely did. It's safe to say I learned a lot about high altitude climbing: when your Tanzanian guide says, "pole pole" (pronounced "po-lay po-lay") he's telling you to walk very slowly, and you do that for good reason!

I've also learned much about African culture and the significance of this mountain to its neighboring peoples.

Climbing Kilimanjaro was both an extreme physical and mental challenge. When you are one false step away from a twisted ankle, you must pay very close attention to your every move. When the thin air brings you headaches that won't go away, you are always thinking about your every breath...slow and deliberate. And when you need to dig deep and grab that energy you didn't know you had, you go back to what inspired you in the first place, in my case my family and especially my "mountain climber" son Justin.

The mountain is nothing short of breathtaking. Early into our climb, we hear the screams of the monkeys in the rainforest. Four ecosystems, 19,000 feet, and seven days later, we are touching glaciers that we know will be gone in the next 10-15 years (due to global warming). The three subzero nights were tough, as were the 50 mph winds that blew away our mess tent. But living above the clouds, enjoying the team camaraderie, seeing more stars at night than I had ever seen before, and of course standing on Kilimanjaro's summit made it all worthwhile.

We want to thank you all for your generous support with this fundraiser. To date we have raised over \$36,000 for FD research and donations are still coming in. I cannot describe for



you how much your notes, e-mails, and phone calls have meant to me, and to Justin! He's as

proud of his Dad as I am of him..."you made it Dad, I knew you would!"

This was an emotional journey for me. The moment I touched that first glacier...my first glimpse of the summit...calling Stacey at 2:00 a.m. to tell her I made it (satellite phones are wonderful)

...Justin's hug when I arrived back home...I knew I had done something special. We raised some much-needed money (all going to research) and we certainly raised some awareness about FD, and again I am so grateful for your support.
